From the Secretary's Desk

In recent years the focus of Ashadeep's work has been towards persons with mental health problems in remote areas of Assam and 'homeless persons with mental illnesses'. We are happy today that the Assam Government has also started to focus on these two areas, by developing innovative action plans to address the needs. Ashadeep has played an active role in formulating these policies and further is today a major partner of the Government in implementing these plans.

The collaboration with the Government in setting up the two 'Rehabilitation homes for homeless men and women with mental disorders' in the Social welfare department's P.L. Home complex ,Boko has been a significant milestone in the mental health history of the State. On the other hand, the 'Community Mental Health Programme' in association with local NGOs and the Primary Health services of the Government in Sipajhar and Mayong revenue blocks would supplement the efforts of the Government 'State Mental Health program'.

On another note, I would like to point out that the rapid expansion of Ashadeep's work obviously entails the need for higher inputs, both manpower and material. The pressures of HR management, resource generation, accounting, reporting, etc have also simueltaneously grown rapidly. 

# **Programme and Activity Information**

# DAY REHABILITATION CENTRE for the Mentally Challenged, Guwahati (*Established* 1996)

The Day Rehabilitation Centre caters to individuals with intellectual disability and associated disorders and persons recovering from mental illness.

For individuals with intellectual disability and associated disorders the activities undertaken are as follows:

- 1. Conventional and Special Education, Living & Social skills training, Sports and Adventure sports, Pre-vocational & Vocational training.
- 2. Sheltered Workshop to facilitate income generation.
- 3. Counselling & Training of Family Care Givers.

Services provided to persons recovering from mental illnesses are as follows:

- 1. Re-instilling social skills including interpersonal and communication skills.
- 2. Counselling individual /group and family members.
- 3. Vocational training.
- 4. Income generation activities at the Sheltered Workshop.

Members of Ashadeep's Day Rehabilitation Centre participated in various special events organized by Social Welfare Department, Government of Assam, other NGOs - 'Karuna Dhara'and 'Matri', international drawing competition of 'the Delegation of the European Union to India', and the Annual IIT-Guwahati festival under their social initiative called 'Udaan'.

Sports continues to be one of the focus areas for physical and mental development of the intellectually disabled children of Ashadeep. During the year 2012 -2013, Ashadeep students participated in various events organized by the Special Olympics (Bharat).

#### Highlights in Sports and Games during the year -

- 10 students represented Assam in the National Games of Special Olympics Bharat held at Bhopal in December, 2012 and two of them viz. Anudhriti Saikia and Pinky Baruah won Silver Medals.
- 53 students participated in the State games of Special Olympics Bharat, Assam held at Guwahati in March, 2013 and won 7 Gold, 10 Silver and 6 Bronze Medals.
- A team of six students from Ashadeep have been selected to represent India in the 2013 Asia Pacific Regional Games to be held at New Castle, Australia in the month of November.
- Ashadeep organized a Unified sports event in collaboration with St. Stephen's School in the month of March, 2013.
- Seven Students of Ashadeep received State Sports scholarship in the year 2012-2013.

#### **Sheltered Workshop**

One of the very positive outcomes of Ashadeep's rehabilitation process has been income generation amongst beneficiary groups through the concept of **'Sheltered workshop'**. This unit has varied range of vocational activities for developing the skills of Ashadeep's beneficiary groups in its various facilities. Depending on the interest and skills, the beneficiaries participate in activities like Weaving and preparing



products out of Jute, Cloth, Paper and Wool. Some special articles produced here are (a) beautiful carpets and door mats made from old clothes, (b) bags and envelopes made from old calendars, news papers, wedding cards and waste paper, (c) hand fans made from incense stick packets, etc. The other items produced here are handkerchiefs, pot-holders, napkins, dress materials, file covers, etc. and crochet products such as mobile covers, door mats and baby blankets.

The individuals engaged in the production of goods and services through the Sheltered Workshop receive monetary incentives. Thus for many of those who had joined for therapeutic needs, the Rehabilitation centre has become a workplace for livelihood generation.

# **ROSHMI : Half Way home for Women with Mental Illnesses (***Established* 2004)

Roshmi Half Way Home, a therapeutic community, aimed at psycho-social rehabilitation of women with major mental illness in residential settings, was established in 2004 at Guwahati.

It's main focus is on training and reinstating in such women the skills required for leading an independent life. The activities at ROSHMI are designed in a way which enables the women to maintain an adequate level of functioning after going back to their families. Vocational and recreational activities are part of the therapies applied for the residents.

Although the Half Way Home was partially supported by the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India, the grants from the Ministry have not been disbursed to us for the past three years. The obvious difficulty in maintaining this facility in the absence of financial support is bringing in an element of uncertainty in continuing with this project.


#### **ABILITY – THE ASHADEEP SHOP**

Thus, this unit of Ashadeep is an amalgamation of all such livelihood generating activities for individuals recovering from various mental disorders.



#### NAVACHETANA - Rehabilitation of 'Homeless Women with Mental Illness'


Homelessness amongst persons with mental illness is a common sight in developing societies like ours where psychiatrist/population ratio is one for every million (source: Ministry of Health & Family Affairs) and poverty looms large over majority of the overall population. Vulnerability within this populace is two-fold in case of homeless women with mental illness whose number has been increasing. In 2005, Ashadeep initiated project 'Navachetana' for rehabilitation of such homeless women with mental illness. The prime objective of this project – 'Navachetana' is to provide care, treatment and rehabilitation measures to these women and to eventually re-integrate them with their families. Psychiatric, and other medical treatment as may be necessary for admitted women and care; Psychological and other social rehabilitation services are provided at the 'Navachetana' residential facilities by a team of qualified personnel including psychiatrists, psychologists, counselors, social workers, and trained health care staff. This project is currently in its third phase of funding (Phase I: 2006-2009, Phase II: 2009-2012, Phase III: 2012-2015) by Sir Ratan Tata Trust and Navajbai Ratan Tata Trust, Mumbai. This process was being undertaken through the three Homes - Navachetana (Transit Care) – 20 beds, Navachetana (Rehab) – 20 beds and Roshmi (Half way home) – 10 beds.<sup>1</sup>

54 women were admitted during 2012-13, the cumulative figure from inception being 426 up to March 2013. Over 80% of the rescued women have been re-integrated with their families. Further, it has been possible to maintain follow-up care for over 60% of the ex-residents of Navachetana.

The most prominent impact of the project 'Navachetana' is that denizens of Guwahati no longer ignore the mentally ill persons wandering or lying in the streets and come forward to extend a helping hand in rescuing such persons. Proof of such attitudinal change is the fact that out of 54 admissions in the year 2012-13, only 12 women were directly rescued by Ashadeep and 7 women have been re-admitted due to relapses. 35 women were admitted by other agencies such as the police and other NGOs, etc. The following pie chart represents the intervention of different agencies in the admission process :

Certain sights linger in our memories long after they have been witnessed. For many of us in Assam it was the graphic visual of that of a woman breast feeding a puppy which was unmindfully and repeatedly being telecasted on our TV screens. The woman on the screen seemed to be unperturbed by the swarm of people gathered around her. It was being reported that she had recently given birth to a girl child who was taken away by local people of the area where she had been wandering for many a months. A few days after this incident was captured by the media and the ensuing hue and cry on talk shows had subsided the woman was brought to Ashadeep by the Police (of Rowta Police Station).

At the time of admission she was displaying symptoms like self muttering, self smiling, uncooperative, and hallucinatory behavior. After she was bought to Navachetana, she was given the anti-rabies injection and attended by a Gynecologist as she was having post delivery related issues. She was diagnosed as having Schizophrenia by the Psychiatrist. Soon thereafter her treatment begun and she was provided with psychosocial inputs. She was called as Tutumoni by fellow residents and staff members.

After recovering substantially and spending nearly about 18 months at Ashadeep, Tutumoni started recollecting names of few of the landmarks near her residence. Her home was traced to an interior village in Udalguri District (BTAD). On reaching her village it was found that that her mother had passed away a couple of months ago and she was survived by two elder brothers and a sister-in-law. She developed symptoms of mental illness when she was around 16 years old. She was under treatment and medication under the consultation of the LGBRIMH at Tezpur. During this period she eloped with a man from her village who had approached her family for her hand in marriage. Post marriage she discontinued her medication which led to a relapse of the illness. Few months later her brother found her sitting near the Tangla Market where he learnt that she was pregnant and has been wandering there on the streets. He brought her to home where she gave birth to a healthy boy child. Her husband contacted her family and took her back to his home along with the boy child. Her situation deteriorated in the absence of any treatment and few weeks later she wandered away from home and started living on the streets. It had been 8 years of wandering in the streets before she found her way to Navachetana and was able to regain her former healthy self. Presently she is leading a normal life with her brothers and continues to receive treatment at Ashadeep's OPD every month.

#### FREE PSYCHIATRIC OUT DOOR FACILITY

Due to the very limited psychiatric care facilities available at Government Institutions where the patient load tends to be very high, the caregivers of persons with mental illness who belong to the marginalized groups face immense problems. Providing access to mental health care for marginalized population has been the prime objective of the Free Outdoor Service (OPD) located at Ulubari, near the Guwahati Railway Station. Along with serving the needs of lower economic groups and mentally ill inmates of different shelter homes, this provision has become the focal point of continuing treatment of Navachetana residents who have been re-united with their families, and also individuals from discontinued Outreach locations.

During 2012-13, 110 new patients registered in the OPD and 640 old patients came for review.

#### **OUTREACH PROGRAMMES**

While intervening with homeless women with mental illness and reintegrating them to their families it was found out that a majority of them hailed from rural areas. Also, a lot of individuals who attended the OPD came from far flung rural areas. Taking stock of such a scenario, Ashadeep initiated outreach

mental health camps in 2006 for individuals residing in rural areas who did not have access to psychiatric interventions. A unique element of this endeavour was sensitization and training of a local NGO and Government service delivery facilities on mental health interventions and the community at large.

Over 1800 patients in nine locations, mostly in lower Assam have been touched through this programme. The details are tabulated below.


#### ASHADEEP OUT REACH PROGRAMME – Overall status From October 2006 to July 2012

The camp approach of Ashadeep's Outreach intervention had been fruitful in the sensitization and creation of access to mental health camp. However **to achieve a more sustainable and holistic outcome in a given area, 'Community Mental Health Programme' was conceptualized in place of the outreach camp model.** As per this programme, persons with major mental illnesses shall be identified and taken care of through the existing primary health care system of the government. Through collaborative efforts in partnership with a local NGO and the Government Primary health services, a sustainable outcome will be strived for. This 'Community Mental Health Program'(CMHP) has been initiated for a period of three years as a Pilot Project with support from Sir Ratan Tata Trust and Navajbai Ratan Tata Trust under Mental Health Initiative.

The basic aim of this project is to empower the community by integrating mental health services with the general community health care system and social care services, and provide socio-economic empowerment to persons with mental illness and their families.

The objectives of this programme are -

- To increase Mental Health services in partnership with Government and Non-Government Institutions, Mental Health professionals, Caregivers and persons with mental illness.
- To increase Human Resource in Mental Health service delivery at Primary Health Care level.
- To increase awareness on Mental Health and reduce Stigma related to Mental Illness.
- To improve ability of persons with Mental Illness to function in family, at work and society at large.

#### PARITRANAM – TELE COUNSELING HELP LINE (995-447-1111)

Emotional and psychological trauma is the result of extraordinarily stressful events that shatter a person's sense of security, making the person feel helpless and vulnerable. Traumatic experiences often involve a threat to life or safety leading to mental imbalance and sometimes suicidal attempts. At such a point of time, counselling (either on a phone line or face to face) can help in easing the levels of stress and prevent unwanted situations.

"*PARITRANAM*" helpline provides free and confidential emotional support for the depressed and suicidal. The help-line addresses needs of all age groups and all kinds of people with mental health issues and is attended by trained counselors.

During 2012-13, 106 calls were attended to through the HelpLine. Some of the callers have become regulars, availing this service to cope with their emotional distresses during various life events.

#### **RESOURCE CENTRE**

Since its very inception Ashadeep had been actively involved in activities pertaining to networking with other civil society bodies and training and capacity building of various stakeholders. In 2009, such endeavours were brought together under the banner of the 'Resource Centre'. It has been a sanctum of various discourses on Mental Health for students from different Schools, Colleges, Universities and



other Professional Institutes such as Tata Institute of Social Sciences (Guwahati), Indian Institute of Technology (Guwahati) etc.

A major project carried out by the Resource Centre in the year 2012-13 was "Awareness Generation on Mental Health through a Process of Developing Communication Products among College and University students" with support from Sir Ratan Tata Trust, Mumbai. The basic idea of involving the youth was the fact that young people are vulnerable to peer pressure, risk of substance abuse, inability to deal with negative self esteem, burden of expectations such as academic achievement, etc. Several mental illnesses also start early in adolescence. Hence, it is essential that of all the age groups, young people are most made aware of issues of mental health. Mass awareness and education on mental health especially of young people could be an effective strategy to improve community mental health. This would be more effective, if communication products/medium such as short films, still photographs, posters and audio clips are used for the awareness campaign, which are prepared by young people themselves with their perception of Mental Health Issues.

The entire programme started with the conduction of symposia at 14 premier colleges and universities in Guwahati, Dibrugarh, Jorhat and Tezpur with around 750 participants, and culminated in a seven day workshop involving selected students. A total of seventy three entries in photography, film-making, poster, and audio clipping were received of which ten in each category were selected for the workshop.

Out of these 73 entries, 10 best entries in each category were selected and the students who made the selected products were invited for residential workshop at Guwahati.

A seven day residential workshop titled "Developing Communication Tools for Awareness Generation on Mental Health" was successfully completed by a heterogeneous team consisting of experts from various creative fields such as filmmaking, photography, etc, and 31 selected students.

The programme was unique as it was for the first time youth of our state were dealing with the sensitive issue of mental health. It was a sensitive yet creative venture involving the user group in creating awareness generation products through modes like photography, film making, audio clipping and poster making.

# DRAWING COMPETITION IN COLLABORATION WITH THE DELEGATION OF EUROPEAN UNION

Though the focus of Ashadeep's work has always been on mental health, we had to make an exception on a request from the Delegation of European Union, New Delhi to conduct a drawing competition on the occasion of World Environment Day. The competitions were held amongst budding artists as young as 8-10 years in over 20 different schools and other organizations including Maharishi Vidya Mandir, Srimanta Sankar Academy, Faculty School, Maria's Public School, St Stephen's School, Assam Jatiya Vidyalaya, South Point School, Nichol's School, Government B.D.S Deaf and Dumb School, Rang Tulika, Snehalaya, Guwahati Artists' Guild, Akritee Art School, Guwahati Kala Vidyalaya, Nilachal Jatiya Bidyalaya, Vidya Mandir, Children's Drawing and Painting School and Ashadeep Day Rehabilitation Centre.

The prize distribution ceremony for this was held at Vivekananda Kendra Auditorium, presided over by **Mr. Pavel Svitil, Deputy Head of Delegation of the Delegation of the European Union to India.** 

#### PARTNERSHIP WITH GOVERNMENT OF ASSAM

To reinforce the element of sustainability in mental health care and bring about systemic positive change Ashadeep has been continuously advocating with various policy making bodies especially at the Government level. Advocacy with Assam Government led to the formation of a Consultative Committee through a Government Notification to develop services and policies for meaningful rehabilitation of persons with mental illness in the state of Assam. Headed by the Commissioner Social Welfare, this group included representatives from all relevant stake-holders both from the Government and Civil society.

Such advocacy resulted in Assam Government prioritizing Mental Health within the ambit of health care, and developing a PPP model with Ashadeep for establishing interventions for **Rehabilitation of Homeless Men with Mental Illness**. As a part of this endeavour a grant of ₹ 1 crore was given to Ashadeep for constructing and furnishing a 40-bedded **Home for 'Rehabilitation of Homeless Men with Mental Illness'** and also to meet the recurring expenses required for a period of 1 year. This facility is nestled within the verdant serene ambience at **P.L. Home Campus, Bamunigaon,** which is approximately 60kms away from Guwahati city. Construction has been completed and the facility was made ready as per schedule, to become operational by August 2013.

The Social Welfare Department, Government of Assam allocated about 27000 sq. ft. land area with 2 dilapidated Assam type houses of about 4000 sq. ft. area to Ashadeep at the same P.L. Home Campus, Bamunigaon, Boko. The idea is to create provision to house 20-30 mentally ill women so that the issue of residential set up in rented accommodation within the city is solved. Accordingly, the old houses have been renovated and the Home has been in operation since November 2012.


